## YOU WERE ASKING by Msgr. P. Stilla

**Q.** Why does Canada use a geographical motto on its crest instead of a religious one, like the United States of America? Their motto is, "In God we Trust" whereas our's is, "From Sea to Sea".

**A.** Contrary to popular opinion, Canada's motto, though it doesn't sound like one, is actually very religious. It is taken directly from the Book of Psalms in the Bible. You should also know that in the United States, two mottos are actually used and only one of them has a religious connotation to it.

**U.S.A. Mottos**  
The religious sounding motto is "IN GOD WE TRUST", as you mention in your question. It was accepted as the official one of the United States fairly recently, in 1956. It can be found on most U.S.A. currency and is always printed in capital letters. The older and unofficial U.S. motto which has been used since 1782 actually makes no mention of God or Religion. Instead, this second and much older one refers to the American 'melting pot of ethnic groups principle': It is: "E Pluribus Unum" (*From the Many, One*).



### Canada's Crest

As I mentioned above, the official motto that appears on our own Canadian coat of arms, has a definite religious and biblical connection. "A Mare usque ad Mare" (*from Sea to*

*Sea*) was officially adapted in 1921. It is the shorter version of verse 8 of Psalm 72 in the Old Testament. The full text of the verse is: "He shall have dominion from Sea to Sea and from the great river to the ends of the earth". Although this verse in its literal context, is about the future reign of King Solomon, it indirectly refers to the ultimate reign of God over all the earth, the prayer and hope of all persons of Faith.

Perhaps this biblical connection is why, in the past, Canada was referred to as a "Dominion". Let's remember then, the real intent of our motto: "May God have dominion in Canada, from Sea to Sea".



## Catholic Women's League

### Did You Know?

**n** The Catholic Women's League of Canada was organized nationally in 1920 and federally incorporated in 1923.

**n** The Canadian League includes more than 100,000 members, in 48 Dioceses and in over 1,400 Parishes.

**n** The League's long history of dedicated service to our Cathedral Parish began in 1939, many years before St. Patrick's Church was actually designated as the Cathedral of the then new Diocese in 1952.

### Knights of Columbus



### The Knights' Crests

The Knights are identified by two crests. This one, to the left, identifies those who comprise the first three degrees of the Order. The shield, the symbol of knighthood is mounted upon a stylized cross. Displayed on it are three objects; a mace (*authority and discipline*) and, crossed behind it, an anchor (*enduring hope*) and a sword (*a pledge to defend the Faith*). The crest of the 4<sup>th</sup> Degree Knights, to the right, represents the Trinity: the globe (*for the Father, the Creator of heaven and earth*); the Crusader's Cross, (*for Jesus, our crucified Saviour*); and, the white Dove (*for the Holy Spirit, Who inspires and guides the Church*).
